Forty three (43) faculty members have been rewarded through PARS-F amounting to be 23,49,267/- (INR) for the Academic Year 2013-14.</p> <p>To promote research we have established Research and Technology Development center, Material Research Laboratory and Business Incubation Center.</p> <p>Sharda University Education Management Information System: We have introduced a Moodle based LMS which is used by all the faculty members.</p>
